Moms For Liberty - Hillsborough County offers incentive for evidence on those violating HB544.

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Manchester, NH, November 15, 2021 We at Moms For Liberty, Hillsborough, NH are working to bring transparency and accountability to public schools by unifying, educating, and empowering parents on their rights at all levels of government. We want to restore trust in the public school system and are proud to be in one of the only states in the country to ban divisive language in public schools. There is a system in our state designed to give parents recourse against discriminatory practices. Parents do not have to work alone to make sure our children have the best education available.

Moms for Liberty, Hillsborough, NH are offering an incentive to any individual who can provide concrete evidence of a public school staff member violating HB544. We are asking our community to bring concerns to us so that we can shine a light on bad practices. We will encourage any recipients to make use of the funds to provide a reasonable alternative in collaboration with the school. We look forward to working with the New Hampshire School Board Association and the Commissioner of Education.

"As parents of school-aged children, our members have a record of supporting our teachers. We have volunteered in classrooms, donated our time and offered supplies. We strive towards having a public school system with full accountability and transparency," said Rachel Goldsmith, Moms for Liberty - Hillsborough County, NH Chapter Chair.

In New Hampshire, the act Relative to the Propagation of Divisive Concepts makes it illegal to teach:

- (a) One race or sex is inherently superior to another race or sex;
- (b) The state of New Hampshire or the United States is fundamentally racist or sexist;
- (c) An individual, by virtue of his or her race or sex, is inherently racist, sexist, or oppressive, whether consciously or unconsciously;

- (d) An individual should be discriminated against or receive adverse treatment solely or partly because of his or her race or sex;
- (e) Members of one race or sex cannot and should not attempt to treat others without respect to race or sex;
- (f) An individual's moral character is necessarily determined by his or her race or sex;
- (g) An individual, by virtue of his or her race or sex, bears responsibility for actions committed in the past by other members of the same race or sex;
- (h) Any individual should feel discomfort, guilt, anguish, or any other form of psychological distress on account of his or her race or sex; or
- (i) Meritocracy or traits such as a hard work ethic are racist or sexist, or were created by a particular race to oppress another race.
- (j) The term "divisive concepts" includes any other form of race or sex stereotyping or any other form of race or sex scapegoating.

In a case where no concrete evidence of illegal activity in public schools is presented by February 15, 2022, we will direct all funds raised for this issue towards literacy programs for low-income students in Hillsborough County.
