### NH Medicaid to Schools

#### • What is Medicaid?

Medicaid is a health insurance program that covers millions of people, including children and adolescents. Eligibility varies by state but 49 states (including DC) cover children with incomes up to at least 200% of the federal poverty line. Close to 37% of all school-aged children receive health coverage through Medicaid. While Medicaid spending on school-based health services represents less than 1 percent of total Medicaid spending, it represents the fourth largest federal program directed at public school

# • What is the Medicaid to Schools Program?

Medicaid to Schools is a benefit of the NH Medicaid state plan that offers local education agencies and school administrative units the opportunity to receive federal Medicaid dollars to **offset costs for Medicaid covered services performed by qualified medical or behavioral health treatment providers in a school setting** to a NH Medicaid eligible student. Parent consent to access a child's Medicaid insurance is required.

### • What are the most recent changes to the Medicaid to Schools guidelines?

The May 2023 Updated School-Based Medicaid Services and Administrative Claiming Guide is the first comprehensive update in two decades! Clarifies and consolidates the policies put forth in the 1997 and 2003 guidance, and expands the flexibilities that states have to streamline administrative claiming for school-based Medicaid Services. The guide reinforces the scope of Medicaid services provided in schools, including encouraging states to expand reimbursement of these services to all students, not just those identified for special education or served under a Chapter 504 Plan. It expands access to Medicaid services for students, including evaluations, counseling, mental health screenings, substance use services, and nursing services, such as medication monitoring.

### • What are some examples of school-based Medicaid reimbursable services?

Evaluations that result in placement and reevaluations; IEP related services; Nursing care services (including screenings); Tobacco cessation; Crisis intervention and stabilization; PT, OT, and services for individuals with speech, hearing, and language disorder; Translation/Interpretation services, and Transportation.

### • Why is the Medicaid to Schools Program Important?

- Medicaid provides health services to students living in poverty who otherwise wouldn't have access to
  doctors. Districts can receive reimbursement for the screening, diagnosis, and treatment of students'
  health problems, often identifying and treating issues before they become more costly and challenging
  down the road. Medicaid funding allows school districts to conduct important early health screenings
   such as screenings for vision, hearing, and mental health issues for low-income students, and many
  of these students rely on schools to provide these services.
- 2. Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), schools are obligated to provide medically-necessary services to students with disabilities. However, Congress has never funded IDEA at the levels it promised forty years ago, and schools are required to serve more students every year on fewer resources. Medicaid funding can help ease this burden on schools because schools can be reimbursed for providing those medically necessary services to students with disabilities.

On August 28th, Mary Toomey, Assistant Superintendent and Gretchen Roussin Drost, the Consultant supporting SAU21's claiming and reporting data, provided an in-depth review of the NH Medicaid to Schools Program, including recent guideline changes and detailed information to support expanded record-keeping aimed at maximizing reimbursement revenue. Special Education Teachers/Case Managers, Educational Assistants, Psychologists, Social Workers, Speech and Language Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, Physical Therapists, Nurses, Administrative Assistants, and Special Services Directors attended this comprehensive convening. Additional school-based "road-shows" are planned to support technical assistance with record keeping requirements.
